Ash Wednesday on 22 February marked the beginning of the season of Lent, the time when Christians traditionally remember the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness and being tempted.

Some have used this season to give up certain things like alcohol or chocolate, but that would only be part of the customs of this season. Jesus Himself not only fasted at that time, but drew near to His heavenly Father. MY LONG JOURNEY TO FAITH

I have kindly been asked if I would write about my journey, my long journey, to Faith and Commitment to God. This commitment, which has come to fruition over the past few years, was symbolised by my baptism this last December in Dedham Parish Church in the 72nd year of my life and will be reaffirmed shortly at my Confirmation.

The first thing to say is that the wonderful events of Baptism and Confirmation are not the end of my journey, which will continue with God's help and the support of the Church family, both here in Dedham, and elsewhere, as my Faith continues to grow.

The second thing to say is that I have not made this journey alone. There have been many fabulous Christian people, too numerous to mention, whose paths have crossed mine. I would like to take the opportunity however, to thank my wonderful wife, Deirdre, whose steadfast Faith has been like a beacon for me, guiding me on my journey, and of course, I know now, that even more importantly, I have also been accompanied on my rather long journey by Jesus.

Why therefore with so much help, has it taken me so long to get to this point?

My parents were of mixed religions, and so I think they thought it best to leave it to me to make my own decisions about my faith. I am it seems not as quick to make decisions as I would like to think!

Apart from school prayers and Sunday Chapel, I received little religious guidance as a youngster, and I adopted in my mind, at that time, a stance that "There was no God"! My education led me, originally, to be a mathematician and a scientist, and I found it hard to believe anything without scientific proof that I did not feel that I understood. I rejected the existence of God and I tried to explain away the wonders of God's creation and the miracles of Jesus.

It is not as if I had not wrestled with this question many times over in my life, but a lot of the delay in getting to where I am now was because I often stopped travelling on my journey altogether. I was uncertain of which direction to move. The great thing though is that I had a constant companion, Jesus, of whom I was then unaware, but I know now that when I paused on my journey, He was sitting patiently waiting for me and when things were rough, He was carrying me.

So, how did things change? I had changed my career from pure science to medicine, becoming an eye surgeon, but I also did a lot of management, becoming the first Medical Director of our Hospital Trust in Colchester.

In my management work I had noticed that often, in order to make change in the way people behave, one had to get them to take a moment and try looking at things from a completely opposite point of view. Things can often look entirely different then.

God had obviously not given up on me because, despite my stance, I always felt somewhere deep inside that I wanted to believe in God. I came to realise therefore, that if I was to give God a chance, that I should completely change my stance, and start believing in God and Jesus. My light-bulb moment! Once I did start believing I found that there was, in fact, absolutely no reason not to and every reason to do so! For if you do give God a chance, of course, He grabs it with both hands, because the thing He wants most is that we should all come to Him and salvation and for that it is never too late.

Then for the first time, I noticed my patient travelling companion, Jesus, and saw that He was not just sitting waiting for me, but shining a very clear light down the path that I should follow. The path which I now try to follow, and though I know I stumble along the way, I know also that I have His ultimate and Divine support to help me, to pick me up and if need be, to carry me.

Before I finish, I have to say that the welcome and support I have received from the Christian community here in Dedham has helped me to personally and publicly commit to my Faith. It has helped to show me that there is a family here that I must be part of; the family of this Church in Dedham, the family of Jesus, the family of God. I am very grateful to you all.

I would encourage everyone to put their Faith in the Lord and to come to our Church in Dedham and experience the warmth of our Christian fellowship and the Joy of praising and serving the Lord.

A beautiful Sunday morning, the sun is shining, the birds are singing and a yellow-crested cockatoo is screeching!

Our family attended the local Anglican church for a family service; my nephew Robert was in charge of the audio visual kit projecting the hymns and bible readings onto a white screen. Robert's wife, Susan played the keyboard to accompany the hymns and songs. We were all given name tags, so that when gathering for refreshments after the service we could introduce ourselves so easily.

I talked to a family from Sri Lanka where we took our toddler, Fiona, many years ago! We flew up to Queensland from New South Wales and thence to Burleigh Heads, a coastal resort on the southern part of the Australian Gold Coast. The pristine beach is cleaned every day, the public facilities, including exercise equipment and BBQ installations are well maintained and well used.

Our family apartment is on the 7th floor with uninterrupted views of the dawn over the Pacific Ocean and sunsets over the hinterland hills to the west! This picture was taken on my birthday, Australia Day!



Occasionally I get to see the full moon reflected on the ocean providing a silvery path from the horizon to the shore. Here, too, we went to the local

Anglican Church, St John's the Evangelist; quite a modern church, but the message is the same: "Follow the Master, Jesus Christ, Our friend the Son of God, and love thy neighbour as yourself".


The Sunday service is Holy Communion; there is a monthly handout giving collects, bible readings and the sermon's theme. There is also an acknowledgement paying respect to the local aborigine people. (This is now usual at conferences and public meetings around Australia).

At the bottom of the front page are two birds standing on twigs: Holly & Ivy for the UK and Wattle for Oz. In between is the Gospel Message: "HOPE, LOVE & JOY" Like our Church Chimes in Dedham, the leaflet gives details of forthcoming events.

I went to one of them: a young adult with learning difficulties and his carer served us with freshly baked scones, complete with strawberry jam and cream and strawberries! I then went to bible study, where the vicar led us in "Lectio Divina" studying the Nature of Fasting. (Isaiah 58)

We realised that we needed to practice to improve our personal conversation with God – "Reading, Meditation, Response and Contemplation". In a book celebrating the first 80 years (1926-2006) there are descriptions of the glass windows and hangings dedicated to prominent members of the Church. I especially liked the one of Jesus and Mary reunited after His time in the Temple.

Thus, dear friends, after a busy 2022 with many challenges, physical and emotional, our faith has been strengthened and the beauty of God's creation and the opportunity to worship "The Incomparable Christ" has been realised. With Prayerful Wishes for 2023 *Geraldine (& David) Watson*



Jesus and Mary reunited after His time in the Temple.


Junior Church Bible, games and fun!

HOPE EXPLORED

Over the last three Wednesday's around 15 people shared an uplifting course at Dedham Vicarage exploring the subject of HOPE, subtitled "What's the best future you could imagine?"

Well, that is a challenging question, and one which we all face from time to time.

Hope is a natural and positive part of our life, and yet in many cases, our hopes dissolve when things don't work out how they should, and we find ourselves disappointed. At it's worst, that disappointment can bear down to the point we feel crushed, angry and even depressed that our hopes have all melted away.

These hopes can relate to personal, local and family issues, or they can be wider hopes regarding Ukraine, Climate Change or the myriad of global events that cause us to have hope for a better future.

This course gave everyone the opportunity to share and discuss the whole issue of how we can see "light in the darkness" following a short film that explored all the aspects of Hope in a friendly and easy-going manner.

Part two covered the meaning of Peace, and how it helps our aspirations for positive Hope, and Part three covered Purpose, and how our life can be useful, joyful and meaningful. Finally the course ended with the difficult subject of death, and how we can realise that part of life's purpose is simply a recognition and preparation for earthly death and a life hereafter.

Eternal life is an unequivocal pillar of the Christian faith, and that's what Christians hope for, based in the firm understanding, that "Christ died, Christ rose, and Christ ascended into heaven". As we are coming into the period of Lent, the Christian experience becomes more reflective and questioning as we draw nearer to Easter, but the atmosphere of joy on Easter Sunday just has to be celebrated as we proclaim each year "Christ is Risen, Alleluia!"

My own "Hope" is that the Reverend Phillip will repeat this course, as I think everyone who attended, found it a really positive experience. This is for anyone, not just those with faith, but also for those who want to hear more.

VACANCY - LECTURER OF DEDHAM

The Dedham Ecclesiastical Lectureship Trust has its roots in the 16th century, but is very much alive today and is looking for a new Lecturer for the parish of Dedham. The Trust was set up in 1577, through local support, to appoint a "Lecturer" – which meant a preacher – for Dedham.

This tapped into a feeling held strongly at that time, that the word of God should be taught through excellent, Bible-based sermons that anyone could come and hear.

For many years, Lecturers appointed by the Trust supplemented the work of Vicars of Dedham by regularly preaching in the parish in accordance with Church of England principles. In some cases their sermons attracted audiences from far beyond Dedham itself.

In the early 20th century, the Trust was altered so that in future the Vicar of Dedham would also hold the office of Lecturer (you may have noticed that the title of our recent Vicars of Dedham has been "Vicar and Lecturer"). However, the Trust scheme also provides that if at any time there is no Vicar or Priest-in-Charge of Dedham resident in the parish, the Trustees must appoint as Lecturer a suitably qualified communicant member of the Church of England. As many of you will know, at present Dedham shares a Rural Missioner with a number of other parishes but has no Vicar. This has triggered the duty to appoint a Lecturer. The Trustees are seeking to appoint a person to be the Lecturer on an unpaid basis. The main function of the Lecturer will be to preach regular sermons in the parish of Dedham in accordance with the principles of the Church of England.

The sermons will be part of usual church services in Dedham. In contributing in such a key way to our worship the lecturer will be an important member of the team that makes those services happen, working collaboratively with the PCC and our Rural Missioner.

This is a great opportunity for a committed, experienced preacher with a Church of England background to teach the word of God and encourage people to listen to what God has to say.

Chelmsford Chronicle, 6th July 1883.

Musical Service at Dedham Church.

An effort to introduce special musical service into the sanctuary was made in the parish church of Dedham on Wednesday evening in last week under the direction of Mr. Edwin Mens. The choir consisted of between 50 and 60 voices, selected partly from Dedham, Stratford St. Mary, and some of the surrounding villages, and partly from members of Mr. Mens's choir and pupils from Chislehurst. The church was crowded in every part, and the reverent behaviour of the congregation showed how thoroughly they entered into the spirit and intention of the service. Evensong having been intoned by the Rev. S. B. Simons as far as the third collect, (Goss's anthem "O taste and see how gracious the Lord is" was sung by the choir. The Vicar then delivered an address, which spoke of the service as an effort to give to sacred music its proper place and to assign to it its appropriate office. It was claiming for the music of the sanctuary the use of the sanctuary itself. Sacred sounds were surely better fitted to the house of God than to the concert room or the music hall. It was not the highest end of religious music to gratify the taste of man, but rather magnify the name and set forth the praises of God. The subject was Stainer's cantata, "The daughter of Jairus," with illustrative passages from other works. The cantata opened with a brilliant introduction upon the fine organ, played with the fine taste and perfect instrumentation which characterise all Mr. Mens's musical performances. The

choral recitative, "In that day shall the Lord of hosts for a crown of glory," was finely rendered by the sopranos and basses. A good effect was produced by separating the voices, the sopranos and tenors being placed in a gallery immediately above the organ and the trebles and basses below. The bass solos were taken throughout by Herr Guither whose fine manly voice was well heard in every part of the sacred building. The pathos which this gentleman threw into the words of Jairus, "My little daughter lieth at the point of death," and again, "My little daughter even now is dead; but lay thine hands upon her, I pray thee; come and lay thine hands upon her, and she shall live," brought vividly to mind the anguished fears of the father, as well his sustaining faith in Jesus as the deliverer from death. One did not know which most admire. the exquisite tenor voice or the devotional rendering of the airs, "Be thou faithful unto death" and "My hope is in the Everlasting," by the Rev. R. M. Hawkins. Miss Edwards's fine contralto voice rang out with its usual clearness in some of the recitatives, and in the beautiful air from Mendelssohn, "But the Lord is mindful of his own," there was a perfect, blending voices in the duet sung by Mrs. Brewster and Miss Bartrum. The last-named lady well sustained several of the soprano solos, and when she sang the words, " And her spirit came again, and she arose and walked," it led to a realising of the scene. Many fine voices were harmoniously blended in the choruses, especially that wonderfully effective one, "Awake, thou that sleepest," and in the grand description of praise, with which the service concluded, "To him who left his throne high," in which the soprano voices several times rose to a clear C.

SUSTAINABLE DEDHAM.

EAST ANGLIA GREEN (EAG) PYLON PROPOSALS.



For anyone not already aware here is a short overview of what EAG means to our local area – 180KM of 50M Pylons through Norfolk, Suffolk & Essex, with undergrounding through the Dedham Vale AONB. Undergrounding means 60 -100M wide engineering works with six Trenches containing three cables in each, as well as working space and access roads. This will need to be re-done every 40 years.



Outside the AONB there will be two 30X80M Sealing End compounds, three 45 acre substations in Ardleigh, with trenching to the coast, along with Battery and Solar farms. Pylons to the north (Higham & Holton St Mary), with a double set of pylons to the south traversing the southern boundary within 1KM (Dedham, Ardleigh, Langham, Colchester, Great & Little Horksley, West Bergholt and so on).

Following Bernard Jenkins letter published in the January edition, there have been several developments which will be of interest to all communities impacted directly and indirectly.

16th January 2023 - The Energy minister, Graham Stuart, sent a letter acknowledging the growing concerns being raised by communities to their MP's. He also outlined, among other things, a £100M program (initiated in December 2022) called the "Offshore Coordination Support Scheme to Incentivise", meaning to Incentivise Energy provider companies like National Grid and wind farm contractors to develop a coordinated approach that minimises impact on communities and the environment. Why this was not mandated at zero cost, rather than an incentive costing £100M, is unknown.

21st January 2023 - A local event was held in Stratford St Mary organised by myself and a group of concerned residents. The event had two aims: to provide information and an update about the proposals to residents (some of whom had incorrectly received land access demands from the National Grid) and secondly, to try and pull together a united front across the Dedham Vale AONB. The event was attended by over 100 residents, representatives from the Local village councils: Stratford St Mary, Langham, Dedham and Higham. Others who attended were Lewis Barber and William Sunnucks (Essex councillors), John Ward (Leader of Babergh council) and representatives from the 'Dedham Vale AONB & Stour Valley Project' and the 'Dedham Vale Society'.

James Cartlidge (South Suffolk MP) also came and spoke at length answering many questions. I had expected to now be telling you what was said at that meeting, but that is now such old news (all be it only two weeks ago) so I'll just move on...

23rd January 2023 - National Grid released an updated newsletter which can be found on the National Grid East Anglia Green website. The Statutory consultation due to start in three months time has been moved back a year to 2024. Additionally, they now plan on having another non statutory consultation this year with a more detailed route provided. This is guite a contentious point as it would appear to go against the planning inspectorate rules around consultations for projects of national significance, specifically that all options need to be presented for consideration, whereas here only one pre-determined route is being offered.

31st **January 2023** – Court of appeal grants SEAS permission to proceed to judicial review in relation to wind farm plans in Suffolk.

2nd February 2023 - Bernard Jenkins managed to arrange a visit to the impacted areas from Graham Stuart, the UK's Energy Minister, and National Grid. Luckily there was time in the schedule and a number of us - ESN Pylons, Stour Valley Underground (a similar campaign), Dedham Vale Society and regional Councillors were invited to a round table discussion about the situation. This covered everything in his letter from the 16th January and additional concerns from around the table.

Probably the most important outcomes for the local area are:

1) The fact National Grid are investigating the possibility of connecting North Falls and 5 Estuaries wind farms directly into the proposed Offshore cable between Sizewell and Kent. This removes the need for all the infrastructure in Ardleigh and could mean a re-route around the AONB. This would seem a sensible approach producing in effect a mini offshore grid. 2) ESO commitment to re-review guidelines for this type of project with an aim to minimise impact on communities, countryside and wildlife. The minister assured us that the outcome of this review would feed into and shape the official consultation for EAG. It would seem sensible to press pause on EAG until after the ESO review, but the nonstatutory consultation is proceeding.

3) It would appear that there will be changes in the proposed routing for the existing plan. Where these are and who they will impact are unknown at this time.

4) If the route does come through the AONB, horizontal directional drilling will be used under the river, A12 and wooded areas. We need to push for this all the way to minimise impact.

7th Fébruary 2023 - A Government re-shuffle and a new department was created 'The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero'. However, the same ministers, Graham Stuart and ultimately Grant Shapps will still sign-off the project.

7th and 8th **February 2023** -Countryfile Filmed a main piece in Aldham, with Rosie Pearson (ESN Pylons) and the National Grid, which is due to air on the 19th February 2023. Look it up on BBC iPlayer or catch-up TV if you missed it.

In conclusion, therefore, National Grid and the Government are now listening. As Bernard Jenkins said in the meeting, "The dial has moved", to which the ESN Pylons response was "Now we just need to move the pylons". So, we must all keep pushing for the right outcome that is best for communities and the environment. Nothing will change if we don't all pull together!

GARDENING NOTES

WE'RE NOT JOKING, YOU TOO CAN PUT ON A SHOW!

On Saturday 1 April (yes, that day), Dedham's Horticultural Society brings its Spring Show back to the village's Assembly Rooms.

There are five areas in which we encourage you to exhibit and, like the autumn show, a range of classes - so it's a perfect chance to show off some of your spring plants. It's free to enter, a lot of fun and a great way to get to know some of your fellow growers, cooks, arrangers and photographers. Even if you think you don't have a green thumb (try anyway, you might be surprised!), there are other options.

Spring is our daffodil show - just as it's dahlias in autumn – but while there a couple of dahlias classes I'd recommend to anyone new to showing, there are many more daffodil classes you can enter and you only need one or three of a kind. Perfect if you have a limited number of plants from your garden, containers or window boxes.



The key to entering is knowing what kind of daffodil you have, as the wrong daffodil in a class will be judged NAS 'not as standard' and disqualified. Yikes! We post examples of how daffodils are formally classified on our website and you can find the classification system on the website of the UK's Daffodil Society

too.

The trumpet daffodil, for classes 1-6, is the one we're all most familiar with. You can check whether you have one by gently folding the petals forward over the long trumpet (sometimes called a cup). If they are shorter than the trumpet, then congratulations you have a trumpet daffodil.



Choose one of the classes based on colour and whether you have enough identical-looking flowers.

Tulips are another good cut flower to enter, though class 17 - three stems in a vase, one variety – is, I think, harder than the other two as each flower needs to look identical. The others just need you to plonk one or five of any tulip into a vase.

Miniature or small bulbous plants (class 20), tulips and most daffodils are excluded by their size, but you can include miniature daffodils like Tête-àtête, Iris Reticulata, Snowdrops, Crocus (if they haven't gone over already), Chionodoxa Luciliae, the Snake's Head Fritillary, Grape Hyacinth (Muscari) and Scilla Siberica.

Apparently, dahlias grown from new cuttings make better exhibition-quality plants than those grown from older tubers. So if you're getting serious about our autumn show, you can start making cuttings from any tubers you lifted and stored ahead of winter. Take them out of 14

storage and pot them up in multipurpose compost, with the old stalk just above the surface. Give them a bit of water and put them on a warm, light windowsill or in a propagator. Once the resulting shoots are about 8cm long, use a sharp knife to carefully cut them free. Dip them in hormone powder and push them gently into a pot of compost and use a propagator or plastic bag to encourage rooting.



If spending March planning for the show doesn't float your boat, then I expect you'll want some work to do in the garden instead. I'll ease you in gently with a bit of cutting back of some ornamental grasses. Take deciduous Calamagrostis and Deschampsia back to ground level before growth starts. You can do similar with pampas grass (Cortaderia Selloana), just watch out for new growth and protect yourself from the sharp edges of their leaves. Tackle Miscanthus towards the end of March or in April, pruning individual stems so you don't accidentally cut off new green shoots. Pennisetum should be done in late April as the old stems protect the crown if spring is a wet one. Whether you're cutting back pampas or planning to show, it's time to enjoy the garden as Spring arrives.

TRAFFIC UPDATE FOR DEDHAM


3rd - 9th December 2022

The results from the Automatic Traffic Counters (ATC's) placed throughout the village in December 2022 have now been published. Please see below the results from the most recent ATCs. They should be examined in relation to the earlier counts on the main access points to the village taken in October 2022


- I have not included Stratford Rdbelow as the speed limit is 60 mph so not surprisingly there were no recorded speeders there. Whether 60 mph is appropriate or not is another discussion to be had with Essex Highways
- I believe the most important figures are those below that show the percentage of vehicles speeding. We are all aware that statistically we are far less likely to be killed if hit at 30 mph and the risk increases exponentially as speed increases.
- Total volume of traffic in the High Street was 14,904
- Total volume of traffic in Brook street was 15,843
- Total volume of traffic in Dedham was 18,430
- By looking at the graphs below and in particular the larger dots that show vehicles travelling at 36 mph and above, that is a huge number of cars with the potential to kill you!
- A better statistician than me could work out an exact figure!

Speeding % Exceeding 30mph


HIGH STREET - North East bound




HIGH STREET - South West bound




BROOK STREET - North Bound



ESSEX RECYCLING CENTRES

From Monday 13 March 2023, residents will have to book a slot in advance to visit any Essex County Council recycling centre. The booking system will open 2 weeks in advance, on Monday 27th February.

There is no restriction on the number of bookings you can make as long as the waste you are disposing of is household waste. The time slot is a 15minutes based on the average time that a resident is onsite when unloading recycling and waste from a car.

If possible, please plan to arrive onsite within your 15 minute window, but we recognise this isn't always possible. If you are a Blue Badge holder, you do not need to book a slot. Please remember to take proof of your Blue Badge with you when visiting these sites.

If you are visiting the sites as a pedestrian or cyclist (carrying your waste from your home to the site), you do not need to book a slot to visit a recycling centre.

If residents have limited internet or accessibility issues that may restrict the from booking a slot online, there are alternative options to book. In the first instance, bookings can be made on behalf of other residents. Residents may also phone the Essex County Council contact centre on 0345 743 0430 Monday to Friday, 8:30am to 5:00pm who will make the booking on their behalf.
